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Participants Responsibilities

Responsibilities for all conference participants prior to and at the CPSA Annual Conference

Chairs

The chair is responsible for monitoring the entire session. The success of a session often depends upon the chair's ability to restrict the length of speakers' presentations and manage questions from the floor.

Some of the most important responsibilities of the chair are to:

- Inquire, on behalf of discussants and other paper-givers, about the status and expected completion date of late (post-May 23) papers.
- Acquaint his/herself with the content of the papers.
- Arrive early at the session and arrange with all participants the order of speaking and the time limits; normally 15 minutes for paper presentations and 10 minutes for discussants is appropriate.
- Start the session at the scheduled time with a brief presentation of the theme of the session and (if possible) the links among the papers.
- Introduce the participants (names and institutional affiliations).
- Maintain strict time limits for each speaker and discussant.
- Moderate panel or floor discussions.
- Adjourn the session in time to allow the room to clear before the next session begins.

Chairs are requested to report the name(s) of anyone who does not show up for a session (presenter or discussant).

In sessions where discussants are expected to prepare comments in advance, the chair has the option to drop from the programme any author not submitting a copy of his/her presentation to the appropriate discussant by May 23.

Please also note the following rules:

1. The CPSA conference will be held during the Congress of the Social Sciences and Humanities (Congress). Each CPSA conference participant must register for both the Congress and the CPSA conference. Anyone who does not causes a loss of revenue for the CPSA and is responsible for any increase in Congress registration fees. By not paying, participants only serve to withhold much needed support for the CPSA and penalize their paying colleagues with higher fees.
2. Each conference participant is responsible for his/her own travel arrangements.

3. Session chairs are not required to be members of CPSA but are more than welcome to join. Membership information is available at <http://www.cpsa-acsp.ca/membership.php>.

Discussants

Discussants are to prepare, in advance, appropriate critical commentaries of the significance and contribution of the papers presented in a session.

Some of the most important responsibilities of the chair are to:

- Arrive early at the session to take part in informal discussions about the order of speaking and time limits (ordinarily 10 minutes is set aside for discussants).
- Situate his/her remarks in a context broad enough to spark questions and stir the interest of an audience that typically has not read the paper.

The following are suggested guidelines for discussants' remarks:

- (1) Given that the audience may not have read the paper it is helpful to begin by stating the major thrust of the paper, identifying its stronger or more interesting features
- (2) Focus the discussion on the paper's major argument;
- (3) Indicate whether you find the argument a compelling one;
- (4) State the basic merits and limits of the paper;
- (5) Conclude by stating linkages between papers.

In consultation with the section head, you may decline to discuss any paper that is received in insufficient time for you to prepare an acceptable critique of it.

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2. Each conference participant is responsible for his/her own travel arrangements.
3. Discussants are not required to be members of the CPSA but are more than welcome to join. Membership information is available at <http://www.cpsa-acsp.ca/membership.php>.

Paper Presenters

If your proposal is accepted, the details of the session in which you will be participating will be available in the on-line programme. Prior to the publication of the programme, you will be given the opportunity to edit the title and abstract of your presentation through the online system.

The responsibilities of presenters are to:

- Provide copies of their papers to all of the other participants in their session by May 23 at the latest. E-mail addresses will be available in the programme. Failure to do this will likely result in the chair excluding the presentation from the session. Further, the discussant has no obligation to comment on a paper if it has not been previously seen. Such an action would be a loss to all attending the session. A .pdf format copy of the paper must be sent to each of the following:
 - a. section head;
 - b. session chair;
 - c. discussant(s);
 - d. any other session participants;

- e. the CPSA secretariat for posting to the CPSA web site.
- Ensure the paper text is SINGLE SPACED, not exceeding the *CJPS* manuscript submission word count of 8,000, including notes and appendices.
- Arrive early at the session to take part in informal discussions about the order of speaking and time limits (ordinarily 15 minutes are set aside for each presenter).
- Prepare comments outlining the major points of their papers. A good presentation is a must for a successful session.

The following are guidelines for preparing an oral summary of a paper (usually 15 minutes):

- (1) No paper should ever be read verbatim. Such presentations are often not only dull but also incomplete due to time constraints imposed by the chair; an author may be cut off by the chair before reaching the most significant aspects of the presentation.
- (2) Highlights of the paper should be given, covering such points as the purpose of the study, the method of analysis, the major findings, and any conclusions or recommendations. The amount of time devoted to each highlight may vary depending upon the author's evaluation of the importance of each area related to the paper. Inexperienced speakers are advised to prepare a "reading text" of approximately 5 typed pages.

Please also note the following rules:

1. For accepted presentations by single authors or multiple authors, each author must be a member in good standing of the Canadian Political Science Association (CPSA) by March 31 whether s/he is attending the conference or not. Membership exemptions will be provided by the CPSA secretariat to invited guests of the programme committee and to foreigners who can provide confirmation of a membership in their national association. The CPSA secretariat will contact all non-members about their membership status before the March 31 deadline. Should you need to become a member of the Association, please see <http://www.cpsa-acsp.ca/membership.php> for more information.
2. The CPSA conference will be held during the Congress of the Social Sciences and Humanities (Congress). Each CPSA conference participant must register for both the Congress and the CPSA conference. Anyone who does not causes a loss of revenue for the CPSA and is responsible for any increase in registration fees. By not paying, participants only serve to withhold much needed support for the CPSA and penalize their paying colleagues with higher fees.
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Poster Presenters

Posters session(s) instructions:

1. Posters should contain the following information:
 - the title and author(s);
 - the current degree program or last degree of the author;
 - the abstract (in large font);
 - an introduction to the research question, methods (as appropriate), results, and a short bibliography; and
 - any tables or figures that communicate the results of the research.

2. Posters are to be 3' x 4' in size. Beyond size, there is no specific format for either the visual display of the poster or the three-minute presentations (see sections 4, 5, and 6 below). The judges encourage creativity, clarity and communication of scholarly contributions and will be looking for these during the adjudication process.
3. A poster board surface, 4' high and 8' wide, will be provided for poster presenters. It is expected that each board will hold four (4) posters (2 on each side). Fastening pins will be available at the conference but presenters are permitted to bring their own fastening materials.
4. Poster presenters:
 - should note that visual representations of results will be more effective than text (Click [HERE](#) to see winning and runner-up posters in previous competitions);
 - should send a .pdf version of the poster to the **CPSA Secretariat** for uploading to the CPSA Web site **one week** prior to the conference start date;
 - must prepare their poster for display and be present at their poster session if they wish to be considered for the prize;
 - are expected to prepare a three-minute presentation of the poster for the jury.
5. Presentations must NOT exceed three minutes. There will be a deduction of points to any presenter who exceeds the three-minute limit AND he/she will be cut off from continuing his/her oratory past that three-minute window.
6. Presenters are permitted to pre-record these presentations and to display them for the judges. If this option is chosen, presenters must provide whatever technology they desire to facilitate the playback of the pre-recorded presentation.
7. The jury and discussants will visit each poster. The jury will use a judging rubric sheet to score each poster applying the following criteria, approved at the CPSA Board of Directors meeting of December 3, 2005: visual impact, clarity and scholarly contribution (see ANNEX II).
8. The Posters Section Head will email:
 - the name of the poster winner to the **CPSA Secretariat** by noon, on the day of the President's Dinner;
 - a separate message to the **CPSA Secretariat** and the finalists (the winner and up to two runner ups - three students, in total), by noon, on the day of the President's Dinner, inviting them to attend the dinner; the message **will inform them that they are the finalists; no mention will be made regarding the identity of the winner; there shall be an embargo on any communication regarding the name of the winner until the announcement is made at the CPSA dinner;**
 - a 100-word citation to be posted as the "Excerpt from jury report" on the CPSA Web site (click [HERE](#) to see previous prize citations) to the **CPSA Secretariat** one week after the conference at the latest.
9. A ticket is reserved for the finalists in case they have not already purchased a ticket. The finalists are asked to settle the ticket with the **CPSA Secretariat** at their earliest convenience.
10. The e-mail addresses listed on the on-line programme will be used to contact presenters. If poster presenters will not have access to their e-mails at the conference, they are asked to submit a telephone number to the **CPSA Secretariat one week** before the conference.

11. If the winner is unable to attend the dinner, the prize will be available for pick-up at the CPSA Information Table until the last day of the conference. If the winner is unable to pick-up the prize, it will be mailed after the conference by the **CPSA Secretariat**.
12. If desired, the winning poster may be displayed at the CPSA Information Table until the last day of the conference.

Graduate Student Three Minute Thesis Competition Participants

CPSA Prize for the Graduate Student Three-Minute Thesis Competition Instructions - Judging Criteria:

1. Contestants:
 - are expected to prepare a three-minute presentation for the juries -contestants exceeding the three-minute **maximum** will be disqualified;
 - should note that they will present their graduate research in three minutes to a jury composed of non-experts (Finals). Therefore, presentations should be accessible, engaging and adhere to rules of plain language (click [HERE](#) to see winning and runner-up presentations in previous competitions);
 - are allowed to use one static PowerPoint slide to augment their verbal presentations (no slide transitions, animations or 'movement' of any description) -no additional electronic media (e.g., sound or video files) are permitted or props are permitted;
 - must be available to present in the preliminary heats (usually "Heat 1" and "Heat 2," to be held during the first two days of the conference) as well as the final competition (the "Finals," to be held on the last day of the conference);
 - must email to the [**CPSA Secretariat**](#) **one week** prior to the conference start date the following information:
 - a message indicating if they authorize the CPSA to video-tape their presentations during the "Finals," and to post them on the CPSA Web site after the conference

- a written summary (maximum of 300 words) of their presentations in both French and English to circulate to jury members
2. The maximum number of preliminary heats will be four, with the number of contestants in each heat and the number of preliminary juries determined by the number of submissions at the discretion of the chair and section head. Usually, four contestants participate in the "Finals." The top scores across the preliminary heats will advance to the "Finals". There is the possibility that the number of contestants who advance from each preliminary heat will not be equal. The contestants who received the top scores per preliminary heats will be informed via email or Twitter after all preliminary heats are complete.
 3. The **Preliminary Jury** (or juries) for the preliminary heats, and the **Prize Jury** for the Finals, will use a judging criteria document that follows the principles of the official 3MT™ of the University of Queensland to assess the presentations. The document will be provided to contestants before the competition.
 4. The judging criteria document:
 - assesses two areas: a) Comprehension and Content, and b) Engagement and Communication Style;
 - is composed of twelve questions graded on a scale of 0 (strongly disagree) to 5 (strongly agree).
 5. The **Preliminary Jury** (or juries) will have a brief period after presentations are delivered to complete their judging criteria document.
 6. One jury member is responsible for the initial tabulation of the scores, and a second jury member confirms the tabulation is correct.
 7. The contestants of the preliminary heats with the highest scores will participate in the Finals. In the unlikely event of a tie, the chair will cast the deciding vote.
 8. The **Prize Jury** for the Finals:
 - will not deliberate on the presentations;
 - will have a brief period after presentations are delivered to complete their judging criteria document.
 9. One jury member is responsible for the initial tabulation of the scores, and a second jury member confirms the tabulation is correct.
 10. The contestant(s) with the highest score will win the competition.
 11. In the unlikely event of a tie, the prize will be divided equally.
 12. The chair must email:
 - the name of the winner and runners-up to the **CPSA Secretariat** as soon as the competition is over;

Sylvia Bashevkin, *Women as Foreign Policy Leaders: National Security and Gender Politics in Superpower America*, Oxford 2018

Sylvia Bashevkin's *Women as Foreign Policy Leaders* breaks new ground in IR scholarship by challenging deep-seated assumptions about female leadership and gender relations in high-level diplomacy. Bashevkin draws upon insights from feminist diplomatic history and case studies of four top U.S. female national security officials across different presidential administrations to argue that women in positions of diplomatic power transcend pacifist gender stereotypes. All four women - Jeane Kirkpatrick, Madeleine Albright, Condoleezza Rice, and Hillary Rodham Clinton - had long track records of forceful, decisive leadership before rising to top positions, and once in power acted to assertively and effectively shape U.S. national security policy despite facing gender-based critiques and discrimination. Theoretically rich and engagingly written, *Women as Foreign Policy Leaders* exemplifies the central importance of feminist IR scholarship to the discipline of political science.

Sylvia Bashevkin, *Women as Foreign Policy Leaders: National Security and Gender Politics in Superpower America*, Oxford 2018

Women as Foreign Policy Leaders, de Sylvia Bashevkin, innove dans l'étude des relations internationales en remettant en question des hypothèses profondément ancrées sur le leadership féminin et les relations de genre dans la diplomatie de haut niveau. Bashevkin s'appuie sur l'histoire de la diplomatie féministe et sur des études de cas de quatre hauts responsables de la sécurité nationale américaine dans différentes administrations présidentielles pour affirmer que les femmes occupant des postes de pouvoir diplomatique transcendent les stéréotypes pacifistes de genre. Les quatre femmes - Jeane Kirkpatrick, Madeleine Albright, Condoleezza Rice et Hillary Rodham Clinton - avaient toutes les quatre une longue expérience de leadership énergique et décisif avant de gravir les échelons et, une fois au pouvoir, d'une action apte à façonner avec assurance et efficacité la politique de sécurité nationale américaine malgré les critiques et la discrimination sexistes. Théoriquement riche et bien écrit, *Women as Foreign Policy Leaders* illustre l'importance centrale de la recherche féministe en RI dans la discipline des sciences politiques.

Jean-Christophe Boucher and Kim Nossal, *The Politics of War: Canada's Afghanistan Mission, 2001-14*, UBC 2017

Jean-Christophe Boucher and Kim Nossal's *The Politics of War* confronts a major puzzle of Canada's long involvement in Afghanistan: why did politicians never acknowledge that Canada was at war? Instead, political elites framed Afghanistan as a "mission" and used it to attempt to score political points against each other. This created a disconnect between the home front and the theatre of war, making it impossible for politicians to credibly explain to the public why Canadians were dying in Afghanistan. In the end, this led both the Conservative government and

the Liberal opposition to stop talking about the war almost entirely. The book is a powerful indictment of the Canadian political elite and its abdication of responsibility for those they put in harm's way.

Jean-Christophe Boucher and Kim Nossal, *The Politics of War: Canada's Afghanistan Mission, 2001-14*, UBC 2017

The Politics of War, de Jean-Christophe Boucher et Kim Nossal, confronte une énigme majeure de l'engagement de longue date du Canada en Afghanistan : pourquoi les politiciens n'ont-ils jamais reconnu que le Canada était en guerre ? Au lieu de cela, les élites politiques ont présenté l'Afghanistan comme une « mission » et l'ont utilisé pour tenter de marquer des points politiques les uns contre les autres. Cela a créé un fossé entre le front intérieur et le théâtre de guerre, ce qui a empêché les politiciens d'expliquer de façon crédible au public pourquoi des Canadiens mouraient en Afghanistan. En fin de compte, cela a amené le gouvernement conservateur et l'opposition libérale à cesser de parler presque entièrement de la guerre. Le livre est un puissant réquisitoire contre l'élite politique canadienne et son abdication de sa responsabilité à l'égard de ceux qu'elle met en danger.

Richard W. Carney, *Authoritarian Capitalism: Sovereign Wealth Funds and State-Owned Enterprises in East Asia and Beyond*, Cambridge 2018

Richard W. Carney's *Authoritarian Capitalism* proposes a sophisticated theory to deal with a timely subject. Despite the rise of illiberal democracies like China, Malaysia, and Singapore, authoritarian capitalism is relatively neglected in the study of international political economy, where specialists remain too focused on the Western world and on the liberal-democratic model of capitalism. The growing importance of sovereign wealth funds and state-owned enterprises is clear: their assets have increased from one trillion in 2000 to more than seven trillion in 2015. Carney demonstrates conclusively that authoritarian leaders have the capacity to use these economic tools strategically to intervene in the corporate sectors of other countries, which works to consolidate their power and influence both at home and abroad.

Richard W. Carney, *Authoritarian Capitalism: Sovereign Wealth Funds and State-Owned Enterprises in East Asia and Beyond*, Cambridge 2018

Authoritarian Capitalism, de Richard W. Carney, propose une théorie sophistiquée pour traiter d'un sujet d'actualité. Malgré la montée de démocraties peu libérales comme la Chine, la Malaisie et Singapour, le capitalisme autoritaire est relativement négligé dans l'étude de l'économie politique internationale, où les spécialistes restent trop focalisés sur le monde occidental et sur le modèle libéral-démocratique du capitalisme. L'importance croissante des fonds souverains et des entreprises d'État est évidente : leurs actifs sont passés de 1 000 milliards en 2000 à plus de 7 000 milliards en 2015. Carney démontre de façon concluante que les dirigeants autoritaires ont la capacité d'utiliser ces outils économiques de façon stratégique pour intervenir dans les secteurs corporatifs d'autres pays, ce qui leur permet de consolider leur pouvoir et leur influence au pays et à l'étranger.

Anne-Laure Mahé (Université de Montréal), “Négocier la domination autoritaire au Soudan”

This thought-provoking examination of participatory development considers how local elites exploit their populations to solidify their authority. We learn how authorities exert power while projecting engagement which, in turn, deflects central government responsibility for economic problems and pacifies local unrest. The thesis employs an impressive ethnographic approach to field work in Khartoum and El Obeid, including 53 interviews with members of the North Kordofan Renaissance, officials and academics; observation; photography; and analysis of official online videos. The result is a deep case study and original contribution that adds to our understanding of coopted power, social control, and the resilience of authoritarianism.

Anne-Laure Mahé (Université de Montréal), « Négocier la domination autoritaire au Soudan »

Cet examen stimulant du développement participatif examine comment les élites locales exploitent leurs populations pour consolider leur autorité. Nous apprenons comment les autorités exercent le pouvoir tout en projetant l'engagement qui, à son tour, détourne la responsabilité du gouvernement central des problèmes économiques et pacifie les troubles locaux. La thèse utilise une approche ethnographique impressionnante du travail sur le terrain à Khartoum et à El Obeid, comprenant 53 entretiens avec des membres de la renaissance du Nord-Kordofan, des fonctionnaires et des universitaires ; elle repose également sur l'observation, la photographie et l'analyse des vidéos officielles en ligne. Il en résulte une étude de cas approfondie et une contribution originale qui ajoute à notre compréhension du pouvoir coopté, du contrôle social et de la résilience de l'autoritarisme.

Alexandre Paquin-Pelletier (University of Toronto), “Radical Leaders: Status, Competition, and Violent Islamic Mobilization in Indonesia”

This cogent explanation of why some religious leaders use radicalization and vigilante mobilization is based on a study of Islamic clerics in East and West Java. It argues that radicalization and vigilante mobilization are competitive strategies by religious entrepreneurs to acquire status. The thesis draws on 126 interviews with local academics, NGO leaders, religious clerics, leaders of radical groups and local historians; an original dataset of Islamic boarding schools and their clerics; and data from government almanacs. It is a convincing argument that weak institutions provide opportunities and incentives for religious actors to radicalize and mobilize their followers for violence.

Alexandre Paquin-Pelletier (University of Toronto), “Radical Leaders: Status, Competition, and Violent Islamic Mobilization in Indonesia”

Cette explication convaincante des raisons pour lesquelles certains chefs religieux recourent à la radicalisation et à la mobilisation des groupes d'autodéfense s'appuie sur une étude des dignitaires religieux islamiques à Java-Est et Java-Ouest. Elle fait valoir que la radicalisation et le vigilantisme sont des stratégies concurrentielles des entrepreneurs religieux pour acquérir un statut. La thèse s'appuie sur 126 entrevues menées auprès des universitaires locaux, des responsables d'ONG, des religieux, des chefs de groupes radicaux et des historiens locaux, un ensemble original de données sur les internats islamiques et leurs oulémas, ainsi que sur des almanachs gouvernementaux. C'est un argument convaincant que la faiblesse des institutions offre aux acteurs religieux des opportunités et des incitatifs pour radicaliser et mobiliser leurs fidèles en faveur de la violence.

Sule Yaylaci (University of British Columbia), “Trust in Civil Wars: The Implications of Conflict Character and Threat on Political and Social Trust”

This highly original study of the effects of civil wars on victims and bystanders considers the implications for political and social trust. The Kurdish insurgency in Turkey and Maoist insurgency in Peru are examined to show that in ethnic conflicts, violence increases trust, whereas in ideological conflicts, violence decreases trust. An impressive array of evidence includes archival research, 82 expert interviews, 158 in-depth interviews, and 34 focus groups, supplemented with cross-national, multilevel analysis of survey data. The result is an exceptional example of mixed-methods research design and contribution to our understanding of the legacies of civil conflict on citizen attitudes.

Sule Yaylaci (University of British Columbia), “Trust in Civil Wars: The Implications of Conflict Character and Threat on Political and Social Trust”

Cette étude très originale qui traite des effets des guerres civiles sur les victimes et les témoins examine les implications pour la confiance politique et sociale. Les insurrections kurde en Turquie et maoïste au Pérou sont analysées pour montrer que dans les conflits ethniques, la violence accroît la confiance, alors que dans les conflits idéologiques, la violence diminue la confiance. Un éventail impressionnant de données probantes comprend des recherches archivistiques, 82 entrevues avec des experts, 158 entrevues en profondeur et 34 interactions avec des groupes de discussion, auxquelles s'ajoute une analyse transnationale multiniveaux des données d'enquête. Le résultat est un exemple exceptionnel de conception de recherche à méthodes mixtes et de contribution à notre compréhension du legs des conflits civils sur les attitudes des citoyens.

Matt Wilder (2018). “Debating Basic Income: Distributive Justice and the Normative-Technical Nexus”, CJPS/RCSP, Vol. 51, No. 2, June, pp. 279-303

This article impresses by its rigour, clarity and the author's ability to successfully combine the principles of Rawlsian justice with the most advanced logistic regression methods to analyze the guaranteed annual income policy. Considering that moral concerns are inseparable from the technical debate, Matt Wilder wants to know if the sense of duty and standards of reciprocity within society must be strengthened to prevent free-riding and make the guaranteed annual income a success. The results of its analysis of the World Values Survey data indicate that the introduction of stricter social standards is not necessary for the success of the policy. Wilder thus removes an important normative and technical obstacle to the introduction of a guaranteed basic income, and shows that this form of redistribution constitutes a credible alternative to current workfare policies. An innovative article that enriches the work of philosophy and public policy.

Matt Wilder (2018). « Debating Basic Income: Distributive Justice and the Normative-Technical Nexus », CJPS/RCSP, Vol 51, No 2, Juin, pp. 279-303

Cet article impressionne par sa rigueur, sa clarté et la capacité de son auteur à combiner avec brio les principes de la justice rawlsienne aux méthodes de régression logistique les plus avancées pour analyser la politique de revenu annuel garanti. Considérant que les préoccupations morales sont inséparables du débat technique, Matt Wilder veut savoir si le sens du devoir et les normes de réciprocité au sein de la société doivent être renforcés pour empêcher le resquillage et faire du revenu annuel garanti un succès. Les résultats de son analyse des données du World Values Survey indiquent que l'introduction de normes sociales plus strictes n'est pas nécessaire à la réussite de la politique. Wilder fait ainsi sauter un important obstacle normatif et technique à l'instauration d'un revenu de base garanti, et montre que cette forme de redistribution constitue une alternative crédible aux politiques actuelles du « workfare ». Un article novateur qui enrichit les travaux de philosophie et de politique publique.

Melanee Thomas (2018). “In Crisis or Decline? Selecting Women to Lead Provincial Parties in Government”, CJPS/RCSP, Vol. 51, No 2, pp. 379-403

Melanee Thomas' timely and original article examines whether gendered patterns of leader selection are the result of women's increased likelihood of being chosen to lead parties in government when those parties are in crisis or decline. Examining the eight women who were selected to serve as provincial premiers in Canada between 1991 and 2015, she offers a careful and considered operationalization of the party crisis and party decline concepts, and then employing several inventive data sources, reveals that the concepts only shed light on four of the eight cases. This excellent article contributes to the comparative literature on gender and leadership, models the best of empirical approaches to test theories, and will no doubt spark further research on the problematic metaphor of the “glass cliff.”

Melanee Thomas (2018). « In Crisis or Decline? Selecting Women to Lead Provincial Parties in Government », CJPS/RCSP, Vol. 51, No. 2, pp. 379-403

L'article opportun et original de Melanee Thomas examine si les tendances sexospécifiques dans la sélection des dirigeants sont le résultat de la probabilité accrue des femmes d'être choisies pour diriger des partis au gouvernement lorsque ces formations politiques sont en crise ou en déclin. En examinant les huit femmes qui ont été choisies comme premières ministres provinciales au Canada entre 1991 et 2015, elle propose une opérationnalisation prudente et réfléchie de la crise des partis et des concepts de leur déclin, puis en utilisant plusieurs sources de données inventives, elle révèle que ces concepts ne font la lumière que sur quatre des huit cas. Cet excellent article contribue à la littérature comparative sur le genre et le leadership, modélise les meilleures approches empiriques pour tester les théories, et suscitera sans doute d'autres recherches sur la métaphore problématique de la « falaise de verre ».

Cheryl N. Collier and Tracey Raney (2018). “Canada's Member-to-Member Code of Conduct on Sexual Harassment in the House of Commons: Progress or Regress?”, CJPS/RCSP, Vol. 51, No. 4, pp. 795-815

The article by Cheryl N. Collier and Tracey Raney provides a very up-to-date analysis of gender relations in the House of Commons. It deals specifically with violence against women in politics. This theoretically innovative article draws on feminist institutionalism to deconstruct the process of applying the Code of Conduct for Members of the House of Commons: Sexual Harassment Between Members. The analysis shows that the institutional norms preceding the application of the Code of Conduct are still present when cases of sexual harassment occur. In other words, the authors show that the new institutional framework imposed by the Code of Conduct has not succeeded in undoing the gender relations instituted within the Canadian Parliament. Not only is the theme of this article very topical, but it is also forward-looking because it provides a new theoretical perspective on the functioning of the Canadian Parliament.

Cheryl N. Collier and Tracey Raney (2018). « Canada's Member-to-Member Code of Conduct on Sexual Harassment in the House of Commons: Progress or Regress? », CJPS/RCSP, Vol. 51, No. 4, pp. 795-815

L'article de Cheryl N. Collier et Tracey Raney propose une analyse très actuelle des rapports de genre au sein de la Chambre des communes. Il traite plus particulièrement de la violence envers les femmes en politique. Très novateur sur le plan théorique, l'article s'inspire de l'institutionnalisme féministe pour déconstruire le processus d'application du Code de conduite pour les députés de la Chambre des communes en matière d'agression sexuelle. L'analyse montre que les normes institutionnelles précédant l'application du Code de conduite sont toujours présentes lorsque surviennent des cas d'agression sexuelle. Autrement dit, les auteurs montrent que le nouveau cadre institutionnel imposé par le Code de conduite n'a pas permis de défaire les rapports genres institués au sein du Parlement canadien. Non seulement la thématique de cet article est très actuelle, mais il s'avère fécond sur le plan théorique puisqu'il apporte un regard théorique neuf sur le fonctionnement du parlement canadien.

Megan Gaucher, *A Family Matter: Citizenship, Conjugal Relationships, and Canadian Immigration Policy*, UBC Press 2018

This text is a well written and timely assessment of the role that family relationships have played to immigrants' access to citizenship in Canada. The author demonstrates how the state is using the provision of citizenship as a means to reproduce and reinforce traditional racialized, gendered, and sexualized assumptions about what constitutes a family. The text makes a rich contribution both theoretically and empirically, combining discourse analysis and more traditional qualitative and quantitative research methodologies to paint a contemporary portrait of the "connections between family, citizenship, and security."

Megan Gaucher, *A Family Matter: Citizenship, Conjugal Relationships, and Canadian Immigration Policy*, UBC Press 2018

Ce texte est une évaluation bien rédigée et opportune du rôle que les relations familiales ont joué dans l'accès des immigrants à la citoyenneté au Canada. L'auteure montre comment l'État se sert de la citoyenneté comme moyen de reproduire et de renforcer les préjugés racialisés, sexistes et sexualisés traditionnels sur ce qui constitue une famille. Le texte apporte une riche contribution à la fois théorique et empirique, combinant l'analyse du discours et des méthodologies de recherche qualitative et quantitative plus traditionnelles pour dresser un portrait contemporain des « liens entre famille, citoyenneté et sécurité ».

Samuel LaSelva, *Canada and the Ethics of Constitutionalism: Identity, Destiny, and Constitutional Faith*, MQUP 2018

This is a beautifully written exploration of the Canadian experiment in constitutionalism. It devotes considerable attention to the place of Indigenous ideas in Canadian constitutionalism and to the meaning and pre-requisites of Aboriginal self-government in both Canada and the United States. The author emphasizes the differences between the Canadian constitution and the British and American models that it borrowed from, specifically that the Canadian model focuses on the rights of others rather than the rights of the sovereign or the individual. This makes for a uniquely Canadian constitutional ethic, which has affected our approach to the Charter, the Quebec secession debate, Indigenous self-government, and the conception of Canada as a multicultural and multinational mosaic.

Samuel LaSelva, *Canada and the Ethics of Constitutionalism: Identity, Destiny, and Constitutional Faith*, MQUP 2018

Il s'agit d'une exploration magnifiquement écrite de l'expérience canadienne dans la sphère du constitutionnalisme. Il accorde une attention considérable à la place des idées autochtones dans le constitutionnalisme canadien et à la signification et aux conditions préalables de l'autonomie gouvernementale autochtone au Canada et aux États-Unis. L'auteur souligne les différences entre la Constitution canadienne et les modèles britannique et américain dont elle s'inspire, en

particulier le fait que le modèle canadien met l'accent sur les droits des autres plutôt que sur les droits du souverain ou de l'individu. Cela donne lieu à une éthique constitutionnelle canadienne unique, qui a influencé notre approche de la Charte, le débat sur la sécession du Québec, l'autonomie gouvernementale autochtone et la conception du Canada comme une mosaïque multiculturelle et multinationale.

Ian Urquhart, *Costly Fix*, UTP 2018

This text provides an engaging, well researched, and concerning presentation of the history of policy making around the Alberta tar sands. Grounding his arguments in the theoretical literature, the author demonstrates how the myth that economic demand has driven the development and growth of the tar sands has concealed consistent state actions including an advantageous royalty, tax and regulatory regime that are the real reasons for its boom. The book provides a nuanced account of the tension between resistance and compromise that shapes the response of First Nations communities to tar sands exploitation, and reveals the ways in which financial ties to the major tar sands companies have sometimes blunted the effectiveness of key environmental groups.

Ian Urquhart, *Costly Fix*, UTP 2018

Ce texte offre une présentation intéressante, bien documentée et avisée de l'histoire de l'élaboration des politiques sur les sables bitumineux de l'Alberta. Fondant ses arguments sur la littérature théorique, l'auteur démontre comment le mythe selon lequel la demande économique est à l'origine du développement et de la croissance des sables bitumineux a caché des mesures étatiques cohérentes, y compris un régime de redevances, de taxes et de réglementation avantageux qui sont les véritables raisons de leur essor. Le livre fournit un compte rendu nuancé de la tension entre la résistance et le compromis qui façonne la réaction des collectivités des Premières nations à l'exploitation des sables bitumineux et révèle comment les liens financiers avec les grandes sociétés d'exploitation des sables bitumineux ont parfois affaibli l'efficacité des principaux groupes environnementaux.

2019 Jill Vickers Prize Prix Jill-Vickers 2019

Brenda O'Neill and David Stewart, "A Glass Cliff? Gender and Party Leader Tenures and Exits"

This is an excellent example of scholarship in the field of gender and Canadian politics that provides original research. It answers the questions many wonder about: how do women leaders differ from men in terms of service to their parties? How and why do they leave? Their findings are perhaps not surprising but certainly hard to witness: the shorter tenure is the result of pressure from party as a result of harsher set of standards for women.

Another remarkably robust study that is longitudinal in analysis from 1968 to 2015, which determines that female MPs are more likely to represent women in parliamentary debate than men, no matter their political affiliation. Methodologically impressive and comprehensive, this is another great example of scholarship in action.

"Avoiding the Spotlight Public Scrutiny Concerns and Political Candidacy in Canada" looks at why members of the LGBTTQ* community may not run for office using dual sampling. The conclusion is perhaps not surprising – the public scrutiny concerns is at the bottom of this. The topic is under-examined and this is a new frontier for qualitative research.

Although 40.9% of all Canadian Political Science Association (CPSA) members identify as women (Abu-Laban, Sawer and St. Laurent, 2017: 7), women are still underrepresented in key leadership roles. For example, CPSA has only had 11 women presidents since its establishment in 1912 (*Ibid*: 9). While important strides have been made to address gender and diversity concerns -- most notably through the establishment of the Women and Politics Section in 2000, concerns about gender equity in the professional abound. Every year, discussion at the Women, Gender and Politics workshops reveal that many female political scientists experience incidents of gender discrimination, which run the gamut from being underpaid to facing gender discrimination in the criteria used for tenure and promotion (e.g., student teaching evaluations, citation indices), to experiencing sexual harassment and assault. The situation is direr for black and Indigenous women of colour. Although CPSA does not collect data disaggregated by race, by indigeneity, and by gender, the experiences of racialized and Indigenous women in the profession have been documented by scholars such as Malinda Smith, who, in her groundbreaking co-written book, "The Equity Myth," highlights how diversity initiatives have done little to improve the everyday working conditions of Indigenous and racialized faculty members, and in particular, racialized and Indigenous women (Kobayashi, et al.: 2017). The purpose of this one-day pre-conference leadership program, to be held on June 3, 2019, the day before the 2019 CPSA Annual Conference starts, is to provide women in political science a dedicated space to build community with each other and to identify ways to improve the situations of women and BIWOC in the academy. By having individual workshops related to professional development (e.g., addressing issues related to career options, research, teaching, and navigating the 'academy'), and to work-life balance (e.g., parenting while 'professoring,' working as activist-scholars), this leadership program will provide both junior, mid-career, and senior scholars the opportunity to learn from each other. Junior scholars will also have the opportunity to be paired with senior scholar 'mentors' who share similar research interests and who can help 'demystify' the ins and outs of political science. Please note: this is a preconference workshop, which will take place the



Grand Chief Stewart Phillip is a long-time Chief of the Penticton Indian Band, Chair of the Okanagan Nation Alliance, and President of the Union of BC Indian Chiefs. The Union of BC Indian Chiefs strengthens Indigenous Nations to assert and implement their Aboriginal Title, Rights, Treaty Rights and Right of Self-Determination as Peoples.

Grand Chief Steward Phillip will comment on:

- The defence of, and advocacy for, Indigenous Title and Rights
- Climate change and its effects on Indigenous peoples and all peoples
- Natural resource extraction and impacts on Title and Rights
- Impacts of colonialism and resulting resurgence of Indigenous activism
- Reflection on over 40 years in politics as an Indigenous leader

Biography

In October 2008, Grand Chief Stewart Phillip concluded his fourth consecutive four year term as Chief of the Penticton Indian Band (PIB), and served the Band as Chief for a total of 14 years. In addition, he served as an elected Band Councilor for a 10-year period. Aside from serving as a member of the PIB Council for a total of 24 years, Grand Chief Phillip continues to serve as the Chair of the Okanagan Nation Alliance. In October 2006, the Okanagan Nation, led by the Elders of the Penticton Indian Band, acknowledged his lifetime commitment to the defense of Indigenous Peoples' Title and Rights by bestowing on him and his family the rare honour of the title of Grand Chief. Over the last 38 years, Grand Chief Stewart Phillip has worked within the Penticton Indian Band Administration holding a variety of positions such as, Band Administrator, Director of Land Management, Education Counselor, Economic Development Officer and Band Planner. Aside from serving as a member of the PIB council for a total of 24 years, he is proud to be in his seventh three-year term as the President of the Union of BC Indian Chiefs. He has taken an active role in the defense of Aboriginal Title and Rights by readily offering support to Native communities in need. He has taken a personal approach seeing first-hand the impact of fish farms in the Broughton Archipelago, lobbying on Parliament Hill to defeat the First Nations Governance Act, standing with Elders of Treaty 8 against oil and gas development in the Peace River, burning referendum ballots with fellow chiefs in protest and has stood on the steps of the Legislature with 3000 other people united under the Title and Rights Alliance banner. Grand Chief Phillip has been married for 33 years to his wife Joan. They have four grown sons, two daughters, six granddaughters and nine grandsons. "I hereby commit to work collectively with the Chiefs of the UBCIC, the First Nations Summit and the BC Assembly of First Nations. We must work together to ensure the governments of Canada and British Columbia endorse and implement the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples for our Nations and

communities. We must work together to compel government to update the Comprehensive Claims Policy to reflect the many hard-fought court victories such as the Delgamuuk'w, Haida and William cases" -- Grand Chief Stewart Phillip.





Should the CJPS become an open access journal?

Open access (OA) is rapidly gaining support in the scientific community. As of 2021, the Canadian Journal of Political Science (CJPS) will no longer be eligible for SSHRC's Aid to Scholarly Journal grant unless its scholarly content is minimally accessible for free within 12 months of publication. The CJPS, the Canadian Political Science Association (CPSA) and the Société québécoise de science politique (SQSP) are vulnerable because transitioning to OA would reduce revenues from the journal's subscription fees and royalties, which represent a significant proportion of their income. A CPSA-SQSP committee has prepared a preliminary report making recommendations on the path ahead for the CJPS in this changing context.
